NEW MILLAGE RATE, TAXES TO GO UP

The Pompano Beach City Commission approved a tax millage rate of 5.770 which represents 11.11% increase in property taxes. This is due mostly because of an increase of the city's taxable property in 2022. The millage rate represents a 5.27 rate for the general fund and .5 for the Pompano Beach Emergency Medical Services District.

The race for Pompano Beach's District 5 is spitting hot.

N Friday, August 19, at a city-sponsored health fair at the Herb Skolnick Community Center located at 800 SW 36th Ave., candidates for Pompano Beach's District 5 had an up-close-and-personal encounter. Incumbent commissioner Cyndy Floyd and her predecessor and sole competitor for the seat, Barry Moss, had an interaction that witnesses say represented the city in a bad light. Moss was eventually asked to leave.

Floyd and an event organizer say that at around 11:30 a.m. Moss entered the facility and accosted Floyd for attending the event, claiming she was campaigning and that it was against city rules. Witnesses say that Moss was yelling frantically at Floyd, so close that his spit was flying in her face.

"With COVID still going around, it's ridiculous that he was so close to me," Floyd said. "He was yelling at me and telling me to get out of the center. I felt very unsafe.'

Moss did not respond to a request for comment via email and phone.

Arianna's Center is Helping the Transgender Community Through Education and Resources

By China Boynton In August, Arianna's Center, a unique community group, held a forum on programs that are available to members of the transgender community ages 50 years old and older. Located in the United Church of Christ office in Fort Lauderdale, Arianna's Center is a non-profit organization that empowers and uplifts the trans-Latinx community, undocumented immigrants, people living with HIV/AIDS, and those who have been incarcerated.

N attendance were representatives from the LGBTQ community, activists, and Arianna's Center founder Arianna Lint who spoke passionately to the group about her journey as a trans-activist.

"This month marks seven years that we have been providing services to the community to show that we can be independent, we can be financially stable, and we can thrive," said Lint.

"Many providers when they come to Fort Lauderdale who want to work in the trans community have to contact us and have to know about us and we are very proud of that."

Rajee Narinesingh, a transgender actress, author, and activist spoke to the crowd about her experience working with Arianna's Center over the years.

"Arianna and I travel to different conferences, and we represent the trans-community because one of the key components of our cause is visibility," said Narinesingh.

South Florida hosts one of



the second largest transgender communities in the nation along with Texas, New York, and Georgia.

Arianna's Center is just one of the few organizations in South Florida that provide access to legal name and gender change services and transition-related care for individuals who are transgender in the community.

Keila Moreno Coleman who has been volunteering with Arianna's Center since its inception in 2015 says that the center has especially helped many marginalized citizens in the trans-community who are transitioning from incarceration back to civilian life.

"When transitioning it's already tough because you don't

have that open community as you would have if you're gay or straight," said Coleman. "To be able to have Arianna's Center which helps in that transition for trans people is necessary for our community."

The event was coordinated by Kendra Hayes and included food and education on how to get your name changed or access to medical care for the senior citizens in the trans community.

"If I can make a difference in one person's life, I can just imagine the impact they can make in other's lives," said Haves.

Pompano Pride - Don't Say Gay - Instead, Go to Stonewall Beach

Palm Aire resident Anthony Kulp was fed up with having just one gay friendly beach to visit. It's located east of Wilton Manor but Sebastian Beach lacks any type of facilities for beachgoers. While it remains a popular destination, Kulp's frustration stemmed from having to commute about 20 minutes through grueling traffic. Without any bathroom facilities or a place to grab a cold drink, he felt there needed to be another choice.

Kulp took action and found an alternative location for his community. "We felt a beach should be straight people inclusive and somewhere members of the LGBTQ+community could feel comfortable sunbathing. Love for my hometown of Pompano led me right to its' shore." With the addition of a new parking garage and a multitude of food and alcohol options just a street away, Pompano Beach was the choice.

The cozy stretch of sand just south of Fisher Family Pier that reaches over to the first lifeguard stand was dubbed, Stonewall Beach. "The riots helped changed the way people thought of the gay community. Stonewall Beach was our way to honor those who made being in public even possible."

Kulp began a Facebook group to promote the new gay hotspot. This past June, one week before Wilton Manor held the annual Stonewall Pride Parade, he hosted the first Kickoff to Pride event at Stonewall Beach with the help of

Topgolf May Be Coming to Pompano

It seems like the popular hangout spot Topgolf is coming to Pompano Beach at the site of the new Live! Resorts Pompano at the

former Isles Casino location. The project received an initial site plan approval from the Planning and Zoning board in June. The plan also includes approval for a Publix at the site. HE 223-acre Isles Casino property is being redeveloped to include dining, entertainment, hotel, office, retail and residential space. The site is being developed by Cordish Companies based in Baltimore.

The Topgolf facility is expected to be north of the current casino building at Racetrack Road and SW

23rd Ave. The proposal includes a three-story building at the 11-acre site with 102 golf hitting bays, event space, full-service restaurant and bar, outdoor seating and a roof terrace.

Topgolf features hitting bays that look over a golf driving range, where golfers of all abilities can take a swing at hitting giant targets using microchipped balls that record your score.

The golf portion of the facility is surrounded by 170-foot high netting.

Topgolf is a global sports entertainment company with local locations in North Miami and Doral. This will be the first Topgolf in Broward County.

The Publix that was approved will have a liquor store, pharmacy, and an outdoor plaza for eating.



Stellar at Palm Aire Gets New Owner, Aims to Help with Housing Crisis

Pulso Capital, a Fort Lauderdale investment group, recently bought Stellar at Palm Aire in Pompano Beach. The firm paid \$21.5 million for the property, according to the South Florida Business Journal.

The complex located at 4091 Seina Circle, 4081-4099 Sunset Way, 700-706 Stellar Court, and 4082-4098 Highland Oaks Drive contains rental townhomes within the Palm Aire County Club.

The firm paid about \$551,000 per townhome.

Stellar at Palm Aire features two-bedroom-, three-bedroom- and four-bedroom units ranging from \$3,550 to \$4,350 a month.



According to Brady, last year CEC renovated 35 locations worldwide. This year, they're on track to renovate 200 locations. CEC expects to have their entire fleet

of over 400 stores completely upgraded within the next two to three







Broward HealthPoint Mobile Unit Rolling Into to a City Near You

Healthcare on wheels is coming to those who need it the most – the uninsured.

BROWARD Health has unveiled its newest addition to help tackle healthcare disparities in Broward County.

Don't let the exterior fool you, the unit has enough space for a nurse practitioner, a licensed practical nurse, two exam rooms, a waiting room, a telehealth area, specialized machines for cardiology and mammograms, and is handicap accessible. The employed medical professionals speak English, Spanish, and Haitian-Creole. There is also a language line that allows medical professionals to connect with people who speak any language, including

Russian, Portuguese, and more.

"We want to empower health in those that are uninsured and don't even have Medicaid," said Dr. Aldo Calvo, Medical Director of the Ambulatory Division at Broward Health.

The Healthpoint mobile unit is the result of a county-wide study with the Broward Regional Health Planning Council to identify our community's barriers to healthcare. One barrier the study found was that people who did not have health insurance were using the emergency rooms within hospitals for issues that could have been handled with a general physician. Within this population, not having blood pressure medicine, or depression and anxiety medicine warranted a trip to the emergency room.

"These things shouldn't be considered an emergency," Calvo said.


Another benefit of the mobile health unit is that it can reduce the burden on local emergency rooms.

The mobile health unit is available to community partners throughout Broward County. Calvo said that there are plans to partner with organizations that help the homeless and faith-based groups to assist in providing medical, emotional, and behavioral care.

"Any organization that has a need can call us," said Calvo.

The care provided is for patients 18 and older. There is no pediatric service or prenatal care, although the mobile unit can refer those in need to other physicians. All care is provided by appointment only. No walk-ins.

the seeds of activism in the hearts of those who attended.

"We wanted people to be engaged in the information so that when they leave, they will have a plan and will be able to access the things that they need," Jones said.

The housing event was extremely popular, with people lining up in the morning to attend the evening event. PNC Bank gave attendees an opportunity to fill out preliminary loan paperwork.

Ashanti Cultural Arts & Enrichment Center received a Community Foundation of Broward's Art of Community grant to address social justice.

Sherry Brown Grovener, Vice President of Community Impact at the Community Foundation of Broward, said she looks for projects that bring the community together, give voice to issues facing our community and generate solutions to those issues.

"Over the past two years our arts' focus has been using the arts as a tool to advance social justice in our community and we are delighted that Ashanti Cultural Arts was one of the recipients of a grant to make that happen," said Grovener. "When it comes to social justice, there are many battles within the fight. So we are trying to empower people to stand up and give voice to their struggle so that we can solve problems and bring about change."

Floyd says she was welcoming people to the event when Moss approached her. Floyd said she worked in the healthcare industry for over 20 years, and she knew most of the vendors. The health fair had over 20 vendors and more than 40 people in attendance. An event organizer, who requested to remain unnamed, said that Moss entered the facility and began "acting crazy...[Moss] asked who was in charge and was shaking like a madman and waiving his fists... a customer wondered if he was there for psychiatric help."

Moss proceeded to get in Floyd's face, yelling at her to leave. Due to his conduct, the event organizer said she had no choice but to ask Moss to leave. Moss left without incident

Floyd wrote an apology to the attendees on Facebook, which stated, "I apologize to all of the healthcare vendors who were first-time visitors to the City of Pompano Beach; I also apologize to those who serve our city, and the residents who felt threatened by

his actions."

Moss wrote in a post that Floyd was using taxpayer dollars to finance a campaign event. He states that Floyd sponsored a campaign event at a city location while wearing a commission shirt to skirt the rules of traditional campaigning.

He wrote: "I am left with no choice but to file a complaint with the Florida Elections Commission and the Broward County Inspector General...unfortunately it will involve the staff of the City of Pompano Beach who I think was bamboozled into doing this."

He added: "Ethics in certain areas of this city are badly lacking and a "pay to play" mentality predominates. Sadly, the Everglades is not the only swamp in South Florida."

The event organizer said that she coordinated with city staff at the Herb Skolnick Center to host the event, and that it was not political in any way. According to the event organizer, Moss' conduct was very unbecoming of a past, present, or future city commissioner. The event organizer said that Floyd appeared to break no rules.

"[Moss'] behavior was not professional," the event organizer said. "He was going crazy demanding the event be shut down."

Although the organizer regrets that politics seeped into her event, she says she will be back in Pompano. "The event wasn't about politics, it was about community health and getting the community the health resources that they need...[Moss'] behavior was so offensive that it would affect me if I was a voter of Pompano Beach, but it will not stop me from bringing the health fair back to the city."

The event organizer said that a representative of the city did call and apologize. City staff at Herb Skolnick could not offer a comment.
