Following an increase in gun violence in Pompano Beach and complaints from concerned residents, Operation Trigger Lock was born to combat the shootings, drug dealings and homicides.

#### Black Residents Demand the History of NW Pompano Beach Be Preserved and Fear Gentrification as New Downtown Project Develops

Pompano Beach, FL – During a community meeting at E. Pat Larkins Community Center, 520 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., residents had one simple demand. The rich cultural history of the black pioneers that built the northwest section of Pompano Beach needs to be preserved.

The meeting was hosted

by Pompano Beach District 4 City Commissioner Beverly Perkins, along with private real estate developer, Phil Mays of RocaPoint Partners LLC, the developer who purchased the Atlantic/Dixie development project. massive development cost approximately \$2 billion and stretch across 75 acres of historic land. ## Ella's Day – A Day of Pampering for Cancer Survivors and their Families

"One day we will be the old people, and our children will be standing where we are today, love them and treat them with respect. They may be the only one around to bring you a glass of water." - Ella Mae Beasley

Lauderhill, FL - Cancer is a beast with long tentacles that stretch from the person diagnosed over to family and friends, with lasting consequences. Ella's Day honors the memory of Ella Mae Beasley and is a day of pampering for the local cancer warriors who fight daily just to have a tomorrow.

HE 4th annual Ella's Day was full of May sunshine and warm breezes as women from around Broward County gathered at St. George Park Community Center, located at 3501 NW 8th St in Lauderhill, to enjoy a warm tribute that honored the strength, resilience and beauty of cancer survivors and fighters.

Every corner of the community center had self-care stations designed for pampering like complimentary massages from Joshua Smith, lash extensions by Phlare, mani's, pedi's and facials by Florida Academy of Health and Beauty, gourmet bites and Mermicorn Treats, and a chemical-free body scrub demo by Sensational Faces.

"Women rarely get a day off," said Taffy Armstrong, 52, who battled breast cancer in 2020. "It's important to live life every day like it's your last. And live it to the fullest. Travel. Become an inspiration."

Those who've witnessed the suffering of close friends, parents, siblings and spouses perhaps should be honored as much as those fighting the battle of life and death. Family members of cancer patients are more susceptible to depression, are less likely to be employed, more likely to be functionally limited and had lower self-rated health compared with family members of non-cancer patients, according to the National Library of











Medicine.

When Beasley first discovered the pea-size lump in her breast back in 1979, there were little treatment options available for women, and almost none for Black women. Despite having lower overall incidenc-

es of the disease, Black women had 40% higher mortality rates than white women.

"Back then, breast cancer meant most women wouldn't survive, especially Black women," said Dr. Pamela Beasley-Pittman, daughter of Ella Mae and Fort Lauderdale city commissioner for District 3. "The lump grew and eventually she was told to remove it, or it would kill her. She opted to have her breast removed. However later in her life when the cancer returned, she chose not

to fight it. She was tired."

Beasley's life journey was faith-driven, and her "What would Jesus do" mentality chauffeured every decision she made. After her last cancer diagnosis, she believed that "If cancer don't kill you, chemo will."

The racial disparity in overall cancer mortality has persisted through the decades and is still the case today. As of 2022, Black women still have a 40% higher death rate when diagnosed with any form of cancer than white women and have the lowest survival rate for all subtypes of the disease, according to the National Library of Medicine.

"We have been reporting this same disparity year after year for a decade," said Rebecca Siegel, Senior Scientific Director for the American Cancer Society, when the report was published. "Differences in death rates are not explained by Black women having more aggressive cancers. It's time for health systems to take a hard look at how they are caring differently for Black women."

Close friends of those who lost the cancer battle came to honor those lives, like Lauderhill resident and poet, Rebecca "Butterfly" Vaughns. She came to Ella's Day to celebrate her mom and her high school friend, Sandra Lee. Lee was performing during a poetry reading with Vaughns when Lee collapsed on stage and later died from cancer complications. The burden of loss was palpable, but signs of hope walked around the community center.

"To be in the presence of living miracles is profound," Vaughns said. "When someone leaves you and you happen to be the last person to hear their final words - its life changing."

Beasley paved the way for local cancer fighters and their loved ones to just be "normal" women for a day. Beasley valued her relationship with Jesus, her five children, and her husband above all else.

The grant program is an acknowledgment of the historical and ongoing systemic disparities that disproportionately affect diverse communities and aims to empower those who are actively working to address and rectify these issues. These grants are particularly aimed at smaller nonprofits who are often overlooked and have trouble obtaining funding.

## Injustice Thrives on Silence - Poetic Just Us Empowered Local Artists to Get Loud

Lauderhill, FL - The rapid rise of spoken word as a form of artistic expression has exploded and creativeminded South Floridians are on a continuous search for an outlet. Poetic Just Us, an annual event held at Chainless Change, located at 4300 North University Drive in Lauderhill, was the solution for those seeking a platform to theatrically and musically perform their poetry.

N a typical day, Chainless Change, is neck deep in supporting anyone caught up in Florida's criminal justice system. They take a unique approach to helping those recently released from incarceration, help those currently incarcerated through "reach-in" work, while actively reducing the cycle of re-incarceration, or recidivism.

The office space of Chainless Change was transformed into a stage. A sign on the wall reads, "Feel, So You Can Heal." Attendees were given a pen and a journal and were given a prompt to create their own poem. Those still looking for their voice were encouraged to read it during the open mic portion.

Many who performed during Poetic Just Us were formerly incarcerated individuals who focused their frustrations and fears into unique pieces of art. Poet, Dax Douglas, spoke about living in the "land of the free," where poverty and privilege collide. He reminded the audience that there is redemption after prison and genuine second chances are possible.

"Imagine wearing a T-shirt that has all of your poor life decisions printed boldly on the front," said Marq Mitchell, one of the founders of Chainless Change, on their website. "That's what it's like having a criminal record."

The poet, Jerrad, spoke about being not just a dad, but a real



father. Chance, who experienced her own stint in Fort Lauderdale's jail, spoke about the Courthouse Blues, revealing her deeply personal experience as a young women caught up in a revolving system.

Ebony Jones spoke about the battle between expectations versus just being, accepting and loving yourself. When poet Kash took the stage, he combined his poetry with hip hop. He spoke on having a feeling while in prison and "Turned the beat in my chest into music."

Miko Atkinson, host of Poetic Just Us, announced poet, Gary Feel, as "the greatest voice ever heard." Feel's poetry piece was "a message for men in the street" titled, "The Gift that is a Woman."

Featured performer, Micah Bournes, is a creative writer,

poet, and spoken word artist. He read from his published book of poetry and spoke on topics like the English language. He linked Shakespearean speak to Black slang, or Ebonics. Bournes spoke how "poets from prison fight evil with poetry" and "beating the chain of stereotypes." He read a poem titled, "A List of Errands Before We Die" which spoke about encouraging a kids' dream,

no matter their goal.

When Bournes touched on Black history, he said "I'm not mad about what happened years ago, I'm mad about what's happening now." Then he read the Color of Money, which touched on racial disparity, and how the release of Harriet Tubman on a \$20 bill is literal tokenism.

Not all poets who performed at Poetic Just Us were formerly incarcerated. New to spoken word was budding poet, Shannon, who spoke about a passage from the Torah titled, "The Angels you Can't See." She then questioned "if creativity is the gateway to the worlds' masterpieces, then why is art always an elective in our schools."

"Some words, some lines, make some uncomfortable," Shannon said, "and that's when you know it's good. Failure is to stop creating."

The collective symphony of voices at Poetic Just Us was like listening to the soulful sound of the people. Anyone can use spoken word to transform their deep-rooted pain into art. Spoken word has become a powerful way to broaden people's understanding of the deep routed issues the disparaged and underserved face on any given day.









BSO's Strategic Investigations Division (SID), Pompano Beach District and many of the BSO specialized units partnered with the Broward State Attorney's Office and several local and federal agencies using intelligence-driven enforcement operations aimed at violent offenders and gang members possibly involved in shooting incidents.

The operation occurred from April 16, 2024 to May 31, 2024. As a result of the six-week sweep, investigators conducted 14 residential search warrants, made 132 arrests and recovered 38 firearms and drugs including cocaine, fentanyl, alpha PVP, oxycodone and heroin.

Operation Trigger Lock was a success due to the dedicated members of BSO's SID, Criminal Investigations Division, Pompano Beach District, B.A.T. (Burglary Apprehension Team), TITAN (Threat Intervention Tactics Analytics Network), VIPER (Violence Intervention Proactive





Response), Real Time Crime Center, Crime Suppression and SWAT teams and the valuable Enforcement assistance from the Broward

Lauderdale Office, DEA Miami Field Division, FBI Miami, HSI of





State Attorney's Office Drug Fort Lauderdale, South Florida Trafficking Unit, ATF Fort HIDTA, the U.S. Attorney's Office, Florida Department Corrections Probation/

Parole as well as the Davie, Fort Lauderdale, Hollywood, Lauderhill and Plantation police departments.

## City Of Miramar Vice Mayor Alexandra P. Davis Secures District 7 Seat Unopposed

Miramar, FL - June 17, 2024 -Vice Mayor Alexandra P. Davis successfully secured the Broward County District 7 Commission seat unopposed when the qualifying period ended on June 14, 2024. This represents a further step in Vice Mayor Davis's journey in public service.

Expressing her gratitude and excitement for the new role, Vice Mayor Davis said, "I am deeply honored and humbled to have the opportunity to serve as the

Commissioner for Broward County's District 7. This position represents a continued commitment to advocating for our communities, ensuring their voices are heard, and driving positive change. I look forward to working collaboratively with residents and leaders to enhance the quality of life in our district."

## **GUILTY AS CHARGED!**

### Former President Donald J. Trump Found Guilty of 34 Felony Counts of Fraud in Cover Up Scheme to Sway 2016 Presidential Election

New York, NY – Donald
Trump learned a hard
lesson today – if you play
with fire, you will get
burned. In a historic jury
verdict rendered earlier
today in New York City,
former president and
current republican presidential candidate, Donald
J. Trump, was found guilty
in the first ever criminal
trial of a former present for
conspiring to influence the
2016 election.

HE verdict was unanimous across all 34 felony charges. Trump is guilty of falsifying business records to cover up hush money payments made to porn star, "Stormy" Daniels, in



efforts to suppress and bury any scandalous media coverage that would have tanked his 2016 bid for the White House.

The shocking verdict is a stunning victory for the prose-

cution and a legal awakening for Trump as his manipulation of the tabloid press was exposed. His direct influence of media stories helped torpedo him from real estate mogul to reality star, and ultimately president of the United States.

With three more felony cases yet to be tried, the fate of Trumps' hopeful revival of being the next republican presi-

dential nominee remains uncertain. Judge Juan Merchan has scheduled the sentencing hearing for July 11, 2024, just days before the Republican National Convention where Trump is schedule to be nominated.

"This was done by the Biden administration;" said Trump to reporters, as he exited the Manhattan courthouse. "Our whole country is being rigged right now. We'll keep fighting, we'll fight to the end and we'll win because our country's gone to hell. We don't have the same country anymore, we have a divided mess. The real verdict is going to be November 5 by the people."

Trump's classified documents trial was initially scheduled to begin May 20th, however earlier this month in Fort Pierce, Judge Aileen Cannon postponed the case indefinitely. That trial is unlikely to begin before the November 5th election date.

#### BSO Asks for Help Solving 4th of July Murder

HORTLY after 7:15 p.m., on Tuesday, July 4, last year, BSO deputies received a report of an adult female who was transported to a local hospital with a gunshot wound. Bucknor died at the hospital.

gation revealed Bucknor was

gation revealed Bucknor was a passenger in a convertible Slingshot vehicle driven by an adult male. According to detectives, they were traveling westbound on Northwest Eighth Street and when they approached the 2900 block an unidentified subject shot at them striking Bucknor. A motive remains unknown.

## Broward Sheriff's Office Homicide Unit detectives arrested a Deerfield Beach man in connection with a double murder

At approximately 5:45 a.m. on Thursday, June 13, Broward County Regional Communications received reports of a shooting in the 4000 block of Eastridge Drive in Deerfield Beach. Broward Sheriff's Office Deerfield Beach District deputies and Broward Sheriff Fire Rescue

responded. On scene, deputies located an adult male, later identified as Andre Lanns, in the street suffering from an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound. Paramedics transported Lanns to a nearby hospital for treatment.

Following an investigation into the inci-

dent, deputies located two individuals, an adult female and a male infant, in a nearby residence suffering from gunshot wounds. Deputies pronounced them both deceased on scene. BSO's Homicide and Crime Scene units responded to investigate the circumstances of the shootings.

Based on the investigation and evidence recovered on scene, late Thursday evening BSO detectives obtained an arrest warrant for Lanns for two counts of first-degree murder. Lanns remains hospitalized in critical condition. The investigation is ongoing.

## The Broward Sheriff's Office Homicide Unit is investigating the death of a man struck by a Tri-Rail train Thursday night in Pompano Beach

Just before 11 p.m. on Thursday, June 13, Broward County Regional Communications received a report of a crash involving a Tri-Rail train and a pedestrian in the area of Northwest 13th Avenue and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard in Pompano Beach. Broward Sheriff's Office Pompano Beach District deputies and Pompano Beach Fire Rescue responded.

The preliminary investigation revealed the man was walking from east to west and stepped on the tracks in front of the train. Witnesses said as soon as the pedestrian got on the tracks he turned towards the oncoming train and was struck by it. Emergency personnel pronounced the man deceased on scene. BSO's crime scene and homicide detectives responded to investigate.

The pedestrian's body was transported to the Broward County Medical Examiner's Office for a post-mortem examination. No foul play is suspected at this time. The investigation continues.

national competition, Pompano's cultural arts district, and it included education on the craft of writing, camaraderie and community. Workshops, bouts, events and "side slams" were spread out among the Pompano Beach Cultural Arts hub, which included Bailey Contemporary Arts Center (BaCa), Ali Arts Center, Blanche Ely House and Museum, and the Pompano Beach Cultural Arts Center.

"The turnout was amazing, considering the [rainy] weather," Richardson said. "Poet slots sold out within four minutes after the announcement, almost like a Beyonce concert. We had a backup plan that had backup plans, just in case. The city gave us four venues and we had four bouts going at once. Logistically, the weather caused some challenges, but we had a shuttle and volunteers offered rides."

Lyrical masters from around the country flocked to the Pompano Beach Cultural Arts Center to compete for the coveted trophy and the title as the best spoken word poet in the nation. Poets from Texas, Virginia, New York City, California and as far as Hawaii immersed themselves into the Pompano community.

"My family has deep roots in Pompano and goes back five generations," said Richardson, board member of Southern Fried Poetry, Inc., during a postevent interview with Villij News. "Charlotte is embedded in slam poetry, and I thought my city deserves this, too. We're going to make Pompano Beach the hub for spoken word."

Slams differ from typical spoken word events because slams are judged and scored, and usually take place over several days, with multiple "knock out", or preliminary bouts. Richardson brought the gift of competitive spoken word to the City of Pompano Beach, and programs such as Lyrics Lab and Exit 36 Poetry Slam have elevated the city into a hub for slam poetry.

poetry is very "Slam competitive," said Saria Goods, President of Southern Fried Poetry, Inc., in a social media video. "It's where an individual or team performs an original they do poems that are funny. Discussions on how to focus and





work of poetry that is scored by a panel of judges. The fun part about slam poetry is you can literally write about anything. It doesn't have to be personal but about a topic you're passionate about. Some poets choose to write about heavier content, things they struggled with in their life, or a traumatic event. Some poets like to go lighter, and

You're going to cover the gamut of emotions when you come to a slam. This year, we've included workshops that tried to cover all different parts of poetry."

The Workshops

Poets that were looking for ways to improve their craft had access to several educational workshops:

Telling the Story refine poetry.

The Feature Set – Feature sets can run anywhere from 20-40 minutes and poets discussed how to keep material tight, relevant and moving.

Poetry Pathways - Narrowing the scope of a poets' artistic vision can lead to multiple successful pathways within the poetry genre.

Avoiding the Burnout -Spoken word poetry is personal and emotional because everyone knows some form of pain. The audience can relate, whether it is spiritual, mental, physical or the pain of injustice. Poets discussed how to take care of mental health while tackling emotional subjects.

Side Slams and Events

In between preliminary bouts, SoFried held "side slams", with events in between. Open mic opportunities gave spectators the chance to try spoken word without the pressure of scores and judges.

To perform spoken word poetry, you just have to want to," Richardson said. "You've got to

get over the fact that your work will be judged and scored. It's like you've got to detach from deeply personal work and place pride to the side. Slam poetry competitions are about coming together with like-minded people, sharing those important stories, educating yourself and honing your craft while empowering each other. When I perform in a slam, I go to learn and to tell my story. Scores and "winning" is secondary."

"Side slams" included the Slam Masters Slam, Erotic Open Mic, and the Rookie Slam. There was "woo-sah" time during Pompano's inspiring, colorful sunrise for Beach Yoga and Meditation. SoFried held a beach party, and a matinee movie at the Pompano Beach Cultural Arts Center that showed the classic movie, Harlem Nights.

"SoFried had such a massive turnout that we decided when registration reopens in August, we're expanding poet slots from 20 to 30," Richardson said. "Every story is unique and we're always looking for fresh voices."

surrounding area questioned how the black community fits into the city's vision for the new downtown project.

"This development open up a lot of jobs for general contractors, landscaping, and overall construction with a focus on local businesses to create a 'local feel," Perkins said, "It's a 'legacy opportunity' to build something lasting for the people of our city that will still be standing long after we're all gone."

RocaPoint's design features include canals, mixed-income residential housing and 800,000 square feet of office space at the intersection of Atlantic Boulevard and Dixie Highway. Because RocaPoint is in the preliminary design phase, they've yet to enter into a finalized agreement with the city and the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA).

One of the biggest concerns residents raised was about the future of the E. Pat Larkins Community Center.

where E. Pat Larkins goes away," Mays said. "Maybe expand or rebuild, but not demolish. We want this development to work for the people who live and work here. We'll consider partnering with local schools to give opportunities to see different aspects of this development, and there are so many different aspects."

Black residents want the first opportunity to apply for contracting and subcontracting work. Some of the other asks were:

- 1. Workforce and senior housing, which differs from affordable housing.
- 2. Training opportunities for upper-level management in Black-owned businesses.
- 3. Resources for the homeless population, especially considering the pending ban on sleeping on public property.
- 4. There has been an uptick in local gun violence typically concentrated in the surrounding area. What type of security "There is no case, no vision measures are being considered?



5. Flooding and appropriate drainage, which is an ongoing issue for all of Pompano Beach.

6. A tall bronze statue or memorial of Dr. Martin Luther King prominently displayed on MLK Boulevard.

Reconfiguration Gentrification

The ongoing project was created to beautify the area and make it more pedestrian friendly and has been labeled as a reconfiguration of the northwest district. But Black residents fear that its gentrification disguised as reconfiguration.

"Old Pompano was run by minority owned businesses, and they prospered," said Robert Lewis, long time "White, Pompano resident. black, blue or green we all pay taxes. If 'reconfiguration' of the northwest community means

we won't be here anymore, then

all this won't matter."

Black residents want assurance that the historic black figures who've come before the big development projects are not forgotten or erased. Some notable local and state leaders agreed, like Florida State Representative, Patricia Williams; Brenda Forman, Clerk of Courts for Broward County; Edward Philips Jr., former Pompano Beach city commissioner of District 4; residents."

and Tom McMahon, current candidate for Pompano's District 3.

"Over the years, the oral history of this area has disappeared," said Janine Jones, resident of Collier City. "We need a physical representation."

Frustration and tensions were high at times during the meeting; however, Perkins assured the community that nothing had been decided or finalized regarding the project. Residents also requested to "have a seat at the table" and want "updates on the timeline from construction to occupation".

"Why do you think the other commissioners aren't here?" Perkins said. "They couldn't take the heat, so they sent Phil, who is a private investor using his own money to bring beautification to Pompano Beach. Call and email your city commissioners. We need you to show up. There will be further meetings to get feedback and suggestions from
